Each week, we will explore one of the gifts of discipleship. In the Affirmation of Baptism service (a.k.a. Confirmation), we speak publicly before God saying that we intend to continue to live out our baptismal callings claiming the faith as our own. The question that we respond to asks us to affirm these five gifts of discipleship as our intent of living out our faith.

QUESTION: Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

- To live among God's faithful people. (Week 1)
- To hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, (Week 2)
- To proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, (Week 3)
- To serve all people, following the example of Jesus, (Week 4)
- And strive for justice and peace in all the earth? (Week 5)

RESPONSE: I do, and I ask God to help and guide me. (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 236)

Introduction to This Week's Gift of Discipleship:

Lent always begins with the reading of Jesus being tempted in the desert. Jesus of course is able to resist and choose God's way. Sometimes we are not as strong, choosing paths which are not healthy or of God. It is not easy. But God gives the gift of community to teach us, accompany us, and encourage us. This community isn't limited to a select few, but it is all of God's people. And together as God's people, we have the opportunity and privilege to do some of God's work in the world today.

In our scripture appointed for this week we are reminded of the joy and gift of being in community. We are grounded in gratitude for all that God has done, and connected with each other through prayer (Philippians 1:3-5). We are also reminded that it is God's peace which we are invited into community with, and with that peace we are invited to live a life of the Gospel- a life of truth, confession and forgiveness, real grace (John 20:19-23). This grace makes community with one another possible. It flows through our baptisms and guides and grounds our discipleship.

*LORD'S PRAYER


Lord remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray:
