PASTOR'S PAGE

Servanthood!?! by Pastor Brad

I recently read the following from *The Volunteer Revolution* by Bill Hybels, which gave me a moment of pause:

Most of us want to live lives of purpose. We want to give ourselves to a worthy cause. But years of bombardment by the messages of a self-serving culture have confused us. Indulge yourself. Fulfill your desires. Satiate your appetites. Pursue pleasure. It's all about you.

Given such messages, it's easy to understand our fear that investing time and energy into serving God and others will diminish our lives. What will really happen, we wonder, if we leave the comfort of the spectator stands and get dirty on the playing fields of servanthood? Won't we be busier than ever and have to work even harder...without a compensating increase in our bank accounts? And if so, does that make sense?

If I commit myself to serving, we ask, will I end up enjoying it or dreading it? Will life really be more fulfilling? Or just more draining? Will it help me grow spiritually or might the extra demands actually weaken my spiritual life? Why should I sign up for this? Will it really be worth it?

This way of thinking or attitude has been around forever. It is human nature for us to think of ourselves first. "What will benefit me?" But Jesus turned things upside down! He challenged the self-serving values of the religious and political authorities of his day by calling people to serve others before themselves. Jesus put forth a radical call to serve God and others.

Jesus said in Mark 8:34-35, "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it." It is

quite a challenge to constantly think of putting the needs of others before our own. This mind set certainly goes against the norm of our society, but yet it is what Jesus calls us to do.

So, take on the challenge of our faith. Be the one who opens the door for others. Choose the back seat of the car so your friend can sit in the front. Take out the garbage even though it's not usually your job. Volunteer to stack the chairs after a meeting,...the list goes on. Help turn the world upside down!

I started writing this article on Monday, April15, prior to the bombs going off at the Boston Marathon. My heart sank as news traveled about those injured and killed in the blast. Yet, in the moments after the blast, I noticed the numerous people who ran toward those who were injured to give assistance. In the midst of chaos, there was compassion.

Today, this quote was shown to me by Mary Lou:

Fred Rogers often told this story about when he was a boy and would see scary things on the news: "My mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping.' To this day, especially in times of disaster, I remember my mother's words, and I am always comforted by realizing that there are still so many helpers – so many caring people in this world."

Even as "society" tells us to look out for ourselves, we absolutely saw the good in people in the midst of the bad.

Jesus calls us to be the caring people in the world—not only during a tragedy, but each day and in all circumstances. That is servanthood—putting the needs of others ahead of our own.

Stewardship: Ways We Give Of Our Time by Rex Quadhamer

1 Corinthians 12:4-7 Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good.

Well, that pretty much sums it up! We are all children of God, but He has given each of us individually different gifts, talents, and interests. When we let God lead us, we are able to use all of these in service to Him. They can be big commitments, such as leading a bell choir or brass group, taking a trip to Tanzania, going on a mission trip to rebuild after hurricane Katrina, or taking a bunch of teenagers to New Orleans for a youth rally. How Can I Get More Involved at Church and in the Community? by Pastor Brad

A lot of people "Do Church." To "Do Church" means to come to worship and then go home. But to "Be Church" is to have what takes place during worship and while among the faith community affect the rest of your week and, in actuality, your entire life. To "Be Church" is to feel cared for by and connected to the community of people that you worship with, serve with, and journey through life with.

Statistics through the Gallup organization show that people who are engaged in the life of the congregation are more satisfied with their life. It doesn't mean that they do not have problems or issues to deal with, but rather they know that they are not journeying through life alone and that their faith is a central focus of their life.

So then, why not get involved at church? If greater satisfaction with your life and a deeper faith life is gained, you have nothing to lose! You benefit as well as the community.

Gallup also states that: "The median number of hours (per week) served by those who were engaged in their congregation was 2½, indicating that the spiritual health of a congregation is a significant factor in the serving capacity of its members."



How to get involved? Find something that you enjoy or have a passion for in the congregation and volunteer. Invite others to join you in the task. Bring your talents and gifts to the life of the congregation, and say "yes" when asked to participate.

We are all encouraged to reach out in concern and service to the world, and to help and assist others in their communities and beyond. In response to the Gospel, we are called to be engaged in proclaiming Christ in all we do and in every aspect of our life.

Men's Breakfast Ministry: What's That All About?

Every Saturday morning, various men of Lord of Love meet at 7:00 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall for breakfast, fellowship, and discussion. All men are welcome to show up and get involved. For those who may be interested in attending in the future, here's a bit of information on what we do at the meetings.



What's for breakfast?

Each week, one of the men volunteers to arrive early and prepare or provide breakfast for the group. The meal generally consists of biscuits and gravy or pancakes or egg bake or some other manly fare along with coffee, juice, sausage, toast, fruit, and the like.

How many men show up?

In the recent past, we've had 10 to 15 men attend, with an average of 12. But we have the resources and capabilities to serve dozens, and we are actively encouraging new people (of the male gender) to attend.

Are reservations required?

No. Just show up any Saturday morning at 7:00 a.m.

What occurs at a typical breakfast?

Here is the general guideline we follow (all times are approximate):

- 7:00 a.m. The men arrive to find that the week's volunteer has breakfast ready and waiting (sort of). A blessing is said or a song is sung as we gather around the table. Breakfast is
 - served. Informative and witty banter prevails.
- We greet Tom Olsen upon his arrival. 7:10 a.m.
- We take up a free-will contribution for the meal. All contributions are voluntary—all men 7:20 a.m. are always welcome to attend and eat for free. The contributions are used for various

benevolences and activities throughout the year. The average contribution is probably

\$2 or \$3 per person.

The meal is finished and we begin the ministry portion of the meeting. This generally 7:30 a.m.

> includes reading from a selected book, or from the Bible, or from the next day's worship service readings. If we are reading from a book, we generally pass the book around the table so that all who want to can take a turn reading, but one is always free to pass the

book along without reading.

7:45 a.m. We engage in a lively and illuminating discussion of said reading.

8:00 a.m. We close with prayer, do the dishes, clean up, and put everything away.

What are you reading now?

On Saturday, April 20, we began a new book, Not a Fan by Kyle Idleman. The author is distinguishes between being a fan of Jesus (who cheers for the team from a safe distance) and a follower (who is actively involved), and maintains that Jesus is not interested in having fans and admirers but desires teammates. It promises to be an interesting and provocative book on what it means to be a true disciple of Christ and should occupy us well into the summer. Our thanks to Paul Murphy for suggesting and providing the book. (Thanks, Paul!)

Hunger Program and Appeal. We all know the story: A crowd of people follows Jesus out to the countryside, and by the time evening rolls around, they're hungry. The disciples tell Jesus to send the people away so they can go get supper in town, and he answers. All four gospels give us this story. Three of them give us the command from Jesus in exactly the same words: "You give them something to eat" (Matthew 14:16; Mark 6:37; Luke 9:13).

When the hungry crowd gathered, Jesus told his friends to give the people something to eat – and then he made sure they could. He helped his friends help the people when they needed it. We modern-day friends of Jesus can still count on his help. The good news is that these three lessons will be on the *Gather* website. You'll just need to print off your copy!


Women's Retreat
