
# Living Your Strengths by Pastor Brad

"What I do you cannot do; but what you do, I cannot do. The needs are great, and none of us, including me, ever do great things. But we can all do small things, with great love, and together we can do something wonderful." – Mother Teresa of Calcutta

For us to do "wonderful things," it helps to know how God has designed us with talents and gifts. Maybe you have the talent of communication, or intellection, or empathy, but how can you use them for the glory of God?

In September, a small group of Lord of Love members went on a journey together called

"Living Your Strengths."
They discovered their talents—some that they didn't know they had yet then shared how others notice them in their daily lives. The exciting part was watching participants identify and name their talents and discover who God created them to be.





Talent Search

Throughout the journey, each person uncovered "talents," naturally recurring patterns of thought, feeling, or behavior that can be productively applied. They shared the things that they enjoy doing and tasks that they rely upon others to help with.


Tickets will be available beginning October 9. Watch for the announcement of the ticket sale deadline.

# Renew, Respond, Rejoice! by Gwen Edwards

In July, I attended my third Women of the ELCA Triennial Convention and Gathering, in Spokane, WA. It was an investment in my spiritual growth, the opportunity to make new friends, and to have a little "me" time. The Convention was July 12-14 and the Gathering was July 14-17.




At the time of the convention, I was the president of the Nebraska Women of the ELCA and, as such, attended the Convention as a voting delegate; there were four hundred delegates plus one hundred non-voting members. I enjoy attending the business sessions. Women of the ELCA is a non-profit organization, and like other such organizations, there is business to conduct. Business included approving the budget, passing memorials, voting on constitutional amendments, discussing and voting on resolutions, and electing the 2011-2014 Churchwide Women's Organization Executive Board. For details visit www.womenoftheelca.org or attend the Women of Love general meeting next month. Highlights for me of the convention were opening worship with Bishop Jessica Crist, ELCA Montana Synod. "Sisters we come here to renew—all areas: our family life, our church life, our spiritual life, etc.," she said. "It is good to be with women who 'get' the

church—with women who are the church." Another highlight was the State of the ELCA report presented by Presiding Bishop Hanson.

A special moving highlight was "yes" when I was elected to the board on the first ballot (third highest votes, but who's counting) and then being installed by the Presiding Bishop. It was not my plan to submit my name for the 2011 ballot; then the phone call came months after nominations closed. Discernment took time and God clearly told me to tell them yes, they can put me on the ballot. It's a story for another time.

After the convention closed, the Gathering was upon us. The Gathering attendance was over two thousand, and it renewed us, invited us to respond, and allowed us to rejoice. We heard from keynote speakers, attended worships, attended inspiring workshops, and visited Camp Dianoigo (Exhibit Hall); it was the home of servant opportunities, hands-on activities, and exhibitors. I took time to help count socks at the in-kind gathering booth, staffed the Dining Hall (Women of the ELCA booth), and made a pictorial prayer journal—where I was reminded that God likes our fellowship. I attended a "Prayer in Our Busy Lives" workshop and hope to put some of the information into practice. Nebraska Women also had lunch with our Sister Synod, Pacifica; it was fun!

Preliminary offering numbers include \$41,797 at the Thankoffering service; \$38,189 at closing worships being split among four recipients; and In-Kind gifts of \$10,420, 11,160 minutes of phone cards, 600 health kits, hundreds of school supplies, 2,225 prayer shawls, and many other clothing kits.





Thank you again for your support during my past six years (three two-year terms) on the Nebraska Women of the ELCA board. Thank you for your continued prayers during the new opportunity where God has called me to serve, serving as Churchwide Executive Board Member. I couldn't do it without my church family.

Within the month, we will be stocking up on Fair Trade coffee and tea products. In order to make sure we have your favorite on hand, please pick up the coffee survey sheet at the Information Center, fill it out, and leave it in the designated basket.



Through the LWR Coffee Project, a partnership between Lutheran World Relief and Equal Exchange, Lutherans can enjoy delicious fairly traded products while supporting small-scale farmers across the world. Farmers earn a fair price for their crops, have access to affordable credit, and can invest in education, health care, and sustainable agriculture, building a better future for their families.

In addition, for all fairly traded coffee, tea, cocoa, sugar, and snacks purchased through the LWR Coffee Project, Equal Exchange gives \$.20 per pound back to Lutheran World Relief for projects supporting small-scale coffee farmers.



<u>Lutheran World Relief</u> works with partners in 35 countries to help people grow food, improve health, strengthen communities, end conflict, build livelihoods, and recover from disasters.



<u>Equal Exchange</u> is a democratically organized, worker-owned co-operative dedicated to building a new model of trade based on fairness, environmental sustainability, and strong relationships between farmers and consumers.

for the time and energy that so many of you have given to be the hands of Christ to others, and we look forward to another productive season next year!

# Mission Possible Update

Remember that the team is still determining the focus for our special mission monies this fall. Thanks to those of you who expressed interest and desire to help particular organizations. One organization

that we will definitely support is our local Lutheran Family Services. Any extra funds from Wednesday night suppers will be given to them, as they do so very much to touch so many lives all across our Nebraska Synod. Thanks to all of you for your ongoing prayers and support.



#### Fall Festival Fiesta to Benefit Food Bank for the Heartland

Yes, we know you already have November 12 marked on your calendar for the Fall Festival. We also know you'll be at church by 4:00 p.m. to look over the craft tables of Lord of Love crafters. Then, we know you will be seated by 5:30 p.m. to enjoy an authentic Mexican dinner served by Iglesia Cristo Rey (Hispanic Lutheran church in south Omaha). Maybe you need reminding, however, that the proceeds of our Fall Festival will be as follows: 25% each to LOL's "Women on a Mission" project and LOL Women's Ministry, and 50% to the Food Bank for the Heartland here in Omaha.





Every day, people here in our community face devastating hunger issues—families that are experiencing cutbacks and layoffs during this difficult economic climate, children who arrive at school hungry because their parents cannot afford to feed them breakfast, and senior citizens on fixed incomes who are forced to choose between food and medicine.

Hunger affects thousands of people in Nebraska and western lowa, but Food Bank for the Heartland is committed to raising awareness about this epidemic and is working to eliminate it.

#### Some data:

- About 21,900 different people in Food Bank for the Heartland's service area receive emergency food assistance in any given week.
- The Food Bank distributed 9,000,588 pounds of food in 2010—a 37 percent increase from 2009.
- 15.9 percent of Nebraskans reported at least one time in the past 12 months when they did not have enough money to buy food that they or their family needed.
- 86 percent of client households served by Food Bank for the Heartland's emergency food programs have low and very low food insecurity.
- 52 percent of clients served by Food Bank for the Heartland report having to choose between paying for food and utilities.
- 42 percent of member households have children under 18 years old.
- 76 percent have incomes below the federal poverty line.
- 19 percent are homeless.
- 74 percent of pantries and 43 percent of shelters reported an increase in the number of clients who come to their emergency food program sites since 2006.

# Hay Lift Donations are Requested

Due to wildfires in Texas, farmers are in need of hay to feed their livestock.

Pastor Robert Sorensen from Brenham, Texas, is willing to help organize a hay lift from the Nebraska Synod to the Texas-Louisiana Synod. At this time, Pastor Sorensen is looking for only commitments for the number of hay bales Nebraska farmers would be willing to donate. Once he has a rough estimate of how many bales are available, he will arrange for a trucking company to back haul the hay to southeast Texas.



The Texas ranchers receiving the hay are offering to pay the freight costs to transport the hay from Nebraska to Texas. If you have hay you would be willing to donate to the Texas-Louisiana Synod, please contact your pastor. Pastors are asked to let the Synod office know how many bales may be available through their mission centers.



More details will be made available as soon as Pastor Sorensen and the Texas-Louisiana Synod are ready to begin the hay lift.

# **ELCA in Action**



There are numerous ways that our larger church, the ELCA, assists individuals in times of need, but one vital ministry is ELCA Disaster Response. There are experts in place throughout the world that take action immediately in times of natural disaster and turmoil. Lord of Love supported ELCA Disaster Response with funds raised this past summer at our Sunday morning breakfasts. We also support the work of the

ELCA indirectly through our mission-share dollars that go first to the Nebraska Synod and then to the larger church. Individuals may always give additional gifts, and it is very easy to do online. The home page for the disaster fund is continuously updated with various work being done, and it is gratifying to read about our church doing God's work through our hands. Another important ministry taking place within the ELCA is the ELCA Malaria Campaign. Just \$10.00 provides a mosquito net that saves an individual's life. In addition to nets, insecticides, medication, health care, education, and more are being provided to people throughout Africa to help eliminate deaths from this disease—for good. # Using Our Gifts - An Extension of Stewardship by Heidi Meyer

I'm not sure how the conversation started between my mom and dad, but somehow it was decided that in the 4th grade, I should learn how to play the piano. Maybe it was because my mom grew up with a piano in her home, and she wished to recapture the days when the family would gather around the piano and sing hymns and Christmas carols. But whatever the reason, a brand new Kohler and Campbell piano showed up in our living room. I started lessons at the age of 10. Of course after a few years, I wanted to quit. Scales were no fun, and I wanted to play popular music. I made a deal with my teacher; if she excused me from scales, I would keep playing. And I did. For the next 10 years, I faithfully took lessons each week. My knowledge and experience grew, and what an absolute blessing this gift of music lessons has been to me.



In high school, I accompanied our church's youth group on tours where we presented Christian musicals all along the West Coast. When I was a junior in college, my home church purchased a beautiful three-octave set of Schulmerich handbells. I joined the bell choir and had a marvelous time. However, I was lazy and marked all my notes L for left, R for right, and M for middle so I would not have to read the music. But my passion was alighted. After college ended, Brad and I were married. We were blessed to have my church's handbell choir play for our wedding. Then Brad and I were off to Ohio to begin seminary. During his third year, on internship, the church to which he was assigned had a bell choir, and I played in their choir for 1 year.

After Brad served two small churches in Creston and Leigh, Nebraska, for 5 years, he was asked to interview at Rejoice! Lutheran Church in Omaha. I was present at the first interview. As we were being shown around the facility, I asked if Rejoice! had a bell choir. I received the most wonderful but unusual response from the Pastor. "We don't have a bell choir, but we have memorial money earmarked for them." I was shocked. What church has the money just waiting there for anything—let alone handbells? Apparently they were in need of a director! Well, I had never directed anything in my life, but I knew I had a passion for playing bells and hearing their beautiful music. So I jumped in, started two adult choirs, and had the privilege of directing them for 10 years. I am extremely proud of those two choirs, the friendships we developed, how we inspired those who heard us, and the level of difficulty of music they attained. And now that same experience is beginning again at Lord of Love. I am thrilled to be directing two adult bell choirs again. And I cannot wait to share with the congregation what we have accomplished so far. I am deeply grateful for the commitment so many have made to this program, either as a ringer or a donor.

Through the wonderful gift of music lessons, my life has been blessed in so many ways—church youth

choirs, Concert Choir in college, adult church choirs, bell choirs, etc. It has always been my thought that because I was blessed with such a wonderful gift, I should share that gift with others. And even though I consider it sharing my gifts, I gain so much in return.

# Using Our Gifts - An Extension of Stewardship, continued

During this fall season, I would like you to consider what your gifts and passions are and ask you to consider using your gifts for the Church.

Suppose you love to cook. What about starting a group that meets once a month on Saturdays at the church where you share recipes, cook, and teach younger girls and women how to cook from scratch? I am amazed at what a lost art this is becoming. One of my most favorite things in this world is whipping up a batch of Toll House Cookie dough, eating several spoonfuls without cooking it, and savoring the homemade cookies, especially the next day. Think of the friendships that would develop, the support that could be given, and the knowledge gained.



Suppose you love to build and create with your hands using tools like saws and hammers. A couple of years ago, I lead a Vacation Bible School craft that involved hammering nails into a small piece of wood. Hardly any child, even the older ones, had ever held a hammer in their hands. Think of how you could pass this love of woodworking on to the next generation.

Suppose you love to read novels. How about reading to an elderly person who can't anymore? Suppose you have compassion for others and want to support some group or event. # From the Council President - October 2011 by Brian Lund, Council President

I tried testing that one Sunday after I had been confirmed. My parents really did not pressure me, but I quickly came to the decision to continue to attend church each week.

My wife has been a real inspiration of faith. She shows me Christ each day with her patience, understanding, and in her caring for others in our circle of friends and church family. She sometimes leaves the daily devotion book out, probably hoping I will find time to read it. We engage in discussion of the Sunday lessons and sermon. Together, we decide how we respond to God's love for us through the stewardship of our financial gifts.

So many other family members and friends have helped and continue to shape my faith. Each week, I see examples of faithful lives and service in many members of Lord of Love. Thank you for continuing to be Christ to me and to all those other people who you encounter in your daily lives.




