#### A Look Ahead

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# Reflecting and Refocusing During Lent by Pastor Brad

"Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me." Psalm 51:10

Lent is a good time to examine and maybe change the way we do things so that we can draw closer to God. When we examine our day, is most of our time spent getting tasks completed and sometimes feeling rushed to get them done? Is our day filled with "busyness"?

Lent helps us to reflect on our day to see where we might pray more often, to see where we might pay more attention to the needs of those around us and ways that we might give more of ourselves. Lent is a time of quiet reflection on how God is working in our lives to change us from thinking mostly about ourselves to how we might think of others. In the midst of our reflection, we see God's activity in our lives, and we then deepen that relationship.

Deeping our relationship with God can be a Lenten focus. I've had conversation with some who, rather than giving something up for Lent, have taken on something for Lent. They have taken on a daily devotion time or added service to an organization or financial support of an institution. This, too, helps us to see where God is alive and active in and through our lives.

In baptism, we received the Holy Spirit of Jesus, and throughout our Christian life, we are given more and more opportunities to share

deeply in Christ's life through an increase in faith, hope, and love. That is why we change the way we do things during Lent: to keep our hearts open to all the great gifts God wants to share with us.

The challenge is to not return to our "pre-Lenten" selves once Easter arrives. Rather than reverting back to our old selves, we can celebrate Easter and all that Christ has done by allowing others to see Christ in us!

Prayer: Lord Jesus, thank you for your continuing presence in our lives. Amen!

On Maundy Thursday, April 21 at 7:00 p.m., we celebrate Jesus' gift of Holy Communion to his followers. On Good Friday, April 22 at 7:00 p.m., we remember the crucifixion of Jesus.



We celebrate the resurrection of Jesus at three services on Easter Sunday, April 24. Join us for the Sunrise Service at 6:30 a.m. or for the more traditional Easter services at 8:00 and 10:30 a.m. Christ is risen!

The celebration of Easter continues on for six more Sundays. Easter is too wonderful to be contained in one Sunday, so it is a "week of weeks," or seven Sundays. That's why May 1 is not the First Sunday After Easter, but The Second Sunday of Easter.

# Why is Easter on a Different Date Each Year?

Easter is always the first Sunday after or on the first full moon, after the Spring (vernal) Equinox in the Northern hemisphere and the Autumnal Equinox in the Southern hemisphere.

The date is determined by a combination of events centered around the lunar cycle, the solar cycle, the division of each year into 365 days and a 1,700 year old Church ruling.

The explanation starts with the fact that early Christians elected to link the date of Easter to the Hebrew calendar. The New Testament states that the Resurrection took place on the first day of the week following Passover. Sunday is the first day of a Jewish week; the Passover falls on the day of the first full moon after the Spring Equinox, which can fall on either March 20 or 21.

Chaotic, or what? The result was that different churches ended up celebrating Easter on various days. And to try to clear up the confusion, the Roman Emperor Constantine I organized a major summit meeting.

The first Ecumenical Council was held at Nicea in present-day Turkey in the year 325. It decreed that Easter would be celebrated on the Sunday following the first full moon that occurred after the Spring Equinox. This retained a lunar connection as a sort of "memory" of the Jewish calendar system, and ensured that the feast would be on a Sunday. Because lunar phases occur independently of the solar year, this means that there is a "window" of several weeks during which Easter may be celebrated. By this reckoning, in our calendar, Easter must occur between March 22 and April 25.

So, go to your calendar, and find the first day of spring - then find the first full moon immediately following that. And Easter will be the first Sunday after (or on) that first full moon.

The system that was slowly developed throughout the Middle Ages is the base for what we use today.

# Tape Ministry: The God Moments in Tanzania as Documented by Doug Roberts

Before a small group of Lord of Love members flew off to Tanzania, Karen Pickens asked a few of them to keep a journal of where they saw God. Doug Roberts was kind enough to share his insights with us in this article. Thank you, Doug!

The God moments were everywhere in Tanzania. One day, we went to a rock quarry where they were mining the lava rock for building blocks. There was this one women carrying blocks up out of the quarry on her head. She made about 3,500 Tanzana schillings a day, which was about \$2.00 per day. We gave her about 15,000 schillings just to take her picture.

We went to schools for handicapped children where there were teachers working with these children; all I can say is what dedication to care for the really needy. Most of the teachers were also learning to become certified teachers as they were teaching. Of the schools we saw, all were using the Montessori method, the same one Rose uses, and I recognized all the little wood projects that Rose is always asking me to cut from scrap wood. All the schools were pretty austere compared to schools in the U.S., but they do with what they have.

We had a small earthquake while in Ndutu right by the Serengeti. It was a small one and only lasted a moment, but what really surprised or scared me was the feeling of the power of the thing. I was lying in bed, and it washed over me just like a wave of water. I heard it coming, and it just kept right on going, more like a locomotive, but it was moving really fast. We must have been some distance from the center, and it was moving through the ground like a wave through water.

We went to the original location of the Lutheran Church in Tanzania, a place called Ashira Parish. It was where the locals at the time thought was a cursed place. When a couple had twins, they would be killed because they thought they were a curse. The bodies would just be thrown into a ditch and left for the animals. Also if someone died and they thought they were cursed, those bodies would also be thrown into the ditch. The church flourished on the spot and is still there today.

Bob Kasworm has started a program called Houses for Health. Lord of Love has participated in that effort, and we got to meet the family that is living in one of our houses. It is amazing what he can build for such a small amount of money.

### Fall Festival

Because of the lagging economy, Omaha-area food banks have experienced a tremendous demand to serve Omaha's hungry. In addition, a recent news report on WOW-TV showed how the rising price of fuel has strained the budget of the Food Bank for the Heartland even more. Its seven trucks travel to 93 counties in Nebraska and western Iowa. The Food Bank budgeted \$69,000 for gas this year, but rising prices have put it on track to spend \$80,000 or more.

For this reason, the women's ministry team selected Food Bank for the Heartland (formerly known as the Omaha Food Bank) as the recipient of monetary support from our 2011 Fall Festival. Food Bank for the Heartland is the largest food bank in Nebraska and Iowa, encompassing 93 counties in a twostate region and distributing approximately 7 million pounds of food annually. The Food Bank serves more than 300 food pantries, emergency shelters, after-school programs, senior housing sites, and rehabilitation centers in the community.

# Highlights of our Nebraska Synod Tanzania Vision Trip by Paul Christenson, with assistance from Craig and Peg Pennell and Doug Roberts

We left Omaha at 11:00 a.m. on Monday, February 7 CDT (8:00 p.m. Tanzania time). Our flight took us to Detroit and a 3-hour layover, then to Amsterdam and a 4-hour layover, and then finally to Kilimanjaro International Airport, 28 hours after leaving Omaha. It's now 11:00 p.m. Tuesday night. After clearing the entry port, we were greeted by a fully costumed Masai choir and brass band. They showered us with music and gifts and then escorted us to transportation for our main hotel while in Tanzania, the Lutheran Uhuru Hotel in Moshi.

#### DAY ONE: Wednesday

Our first morning was to start at 7:00 a.m., but most of us woke to a chorus of roosters starting about 2:30 a.m. and continuing to build their choir to a climax around 5:30 to 6:00 a.m.

When the sun finally made its appearance, we got our first look at majestic Mt. Kilimanjaro. After a breakfast of fruit, juice, eggs, toast, sausage, and coffee or tea, we learned about Mosaic International and its work in Tanzania. This wonderful service of Mosaic (formally known as Bethphage) started in Axtell, Nebraska, and has its home office right here in Omaha. Director Richard Carmen and his wife split their time between Romania, Tanzania, and a home in America. The Magengo parish is host for this ministry and cares for mentally challenged children, allowing their mothers to attend school or find work so they can care for and keep their children in the family unit. Many of the mothers make handbags and other items available for sale to support themselves and their children. We, of course, purchased some.

Our next stop was the Faraja Diaconic Center. This is a community of Deacons that support physically handicapped children and provide rehabilitation and training for those who are often neglected. This center supports a primary school, and they are connected with physical therapy, medical treatment, and other services for students and patients. The parish is heavily funded by a German group, and the school is supported by a family from Missouri.

Our next stop was Ngarony Parish and "future site" of Ngarony youth center. This was our first introduction to a major stumbling block that plagues many Tanzanian communities: "big ideas" but little organization or planning. This particular parish has lofty plans for growth and a road that will bring climbers and visitors to the area. The road would help capitalize on tourist dollars and help fund their youth center. Currently, the youth center is a skeleton structure and has little chance of success unless or until a donor adopts the parish and/or the road is built for a Kilimanjaro summit climb (it's very unlikely the road will be built anytime in the near future). After a light snack of some purple potato thingy (taro root, we think), which we all politely tried to swallow, it was back to Uhuru hotel and a chance to clean up and get ready for supper at the Bishop's home. Once again, we were royally treated and received a personalized English/Swahili Bible and enjoyed another very good meal.

### DAY TWO: Thursday

Another early choir from our roosters (eventually we got used to the dang things), and then it was breakfast and off to Neema orphanage. This is a well-funded facility with solid plans in place. They have a small farm and are building a nurse's training facility that will support itself and help the orphanage. One thing we noticed is almost all children in Tanzania are schooled using the Montessori Method. After another light lunch, it was off to Houses for Health and Mechame Hospital to see Bob Kasworm in action. We were able to visit one home under construction and one of the two homes funded by Lord of Love. We presented the Lord of Love gifts made by our children to the home owner then left for Machame Hospital. To help give you a mental picture of the hospitals, just imagine what it may have been like entering a 1940 or 1950 style

U.S. hospital. That is how I would describe the building style of many of the local hospitals. The hospital equipment will vary depending on funding and support. Due to the relationship with Alegent Health, Mechame Hospital is improving its ability to serve the local communities. Partnerships and relationships like the one Machame has with Alegent are incredibly valuable to the success of health care in Tanzania. The Mechame Hospital trains doctors and nurses and is currently building a nursing training center. Bob shared with us that nurses are in short supply, and if available, he would hire 30 nurses. One member of our tour group is currently supporting a nursing student and had the opportunity to visit with that student for the first time during our tour. We learned from Bob that a couple of students may be dropped from the training program due to lack of funds. It was during this tour that we decided to assist a nursing student with some of the funds Lord of Love sent with us. We had the ability to bring delinquent tuition up to date and fund one additional semester plus leave a few schillings of pocket money for Aimbora Slaa. It is our hope that Lord of Love will support our decision and continue to assist this young lady with her education. Personally (and I know I can speak for my traveling companions), we will find a way to help her finish her education. Once again, we went back to Uhuru and took a walk to Mama Temu (friend of Martin Russell living about a block from the hotel) for a chance to visit, have a few drinks, and relax. Then, we finished the evening with supper at the hotel.

#### DAY THREE: Friday

On Friday morning, most of us were so exhausted we didn't even hear the roosters until almost 5:30 a.m., when the choir was at its climax. (It's great to sleep in.) We had breakfast and then were off to Agape Lutheran Junior Seminary. This is one of the Northern Diocese premier secondary education and boarding schools. Students hoping to enter Agape must go through an application and interview process before being accepted. Acceptance usually means success and almost always assures a chance for continuing with college education. After another light lunch, we continued to Mwika Market and experienced Tanzania outdoor market shopping. Then we took a short walk down the road to Mwika Bible College or SMMUCo Bible Campus. This is an ELCT college that educates students in teaching, accounting, business administration, and several other degrees. At SMMUCo, we meet Jeanne Kocher. Jeanne grew up near Nickerson, Nebraska, and attended Midland University in Fremont. After several years of teaching, she was looking for something more, and she found herself in Tanzania. Like Bob Kasworm, she frequently writes for the ELCA Nebraska Synod Tanzania E-Newsletter, where you can read their articles, and she also writes a blog at avearintanzania.blogspot.com. After we left SMMUCo, we drove down the road to Ashirs parish, where Pastor Rogers and his wife Pastor Carrie gave us a presentation on Tanzanian church history and early Lutheran missionaries. Then we got back in the van and returned to Uhuru hotel and then ate dinner at El Rancho restaurant, featuring Indian cuisine. "Mmmmm" that was a night of good eating.

#### DAY FOUR: Saturday

We had breakfast at the hotel then went on to Ushirika wa Neema Deaconess Center. Driving up to the front gate, I would never have guessed that what lay behind was 40 acres of land with a farm, church, school, boarding rooms, and training center for women wanting to become deaconesses and teachers to serve with the ELCT church. This center was started in 1962 and within 3 years was overwhelmed with applicants and needed to expand in order to serve the community. We learned about how teaching students make all their own Montessori teaching material. The center makes and sells communion wafers, and all students assist with the farming requirements while living and training in this community. After another lunch, we returned to Uhuru hotel so we could start preparations for our afternoon departure and 3-day weekend with a parish to experience life in the local villages.

# Stewardship All Year Long: Caretaking by Deb Lund

I've been blessed with the gift of caretaking for most of my life. I started cooking, baking, cleaning, and doing chores on the farm at a very young age as my mother worked part-time as a nurse in a local hospital and my dad was a busy farmer. I didn't realize it at the time, but we didn't have much money, and we made do with whatever we had.

I got into recycling when it was a very novel idea in the midst of my teen years. There was a recycling place in a nearby town that accepted the new aluminum cans. Some of my friends and I would walk around and collect the rare aluminum cans we could find. In those days, stainless steel pop and beer cans were relatively new, and only one brand used aluminum. (I bet some of you remember what kind that was!)

In my college years at Augustana in Sioux Falls (then ALC and now ELCA), I learned much about stewardship from Dr. Jim Limburg, my religion professor. One basic concept that has stayed with me is that in the beginning, when God gave humans "dominion of the earth," God was giving us the responsibility to care for the earth—the same as was given to kings and expected of them at the time. We are not to "dominate" the earth, but take care of it. Because of my upbringing and my early learning of God's intent for us, I have felt called to do my best to do what I can in all that I do to take care of myself, my family, my community, and my earth.



April 22 is Earth Day each year. Though I think it's great that there's a day to remind of us ways to take care of the earth, I honestly do not think too much about celebrating it. I think it's better to take good care of the earth every day.

I'm glad that there are more and more ways to reduce the use of things that would otherwise go into landfills, to recycle whatever we can, and to reuse items (or the latest word, "upcycle"). I think it's important as people of God to model proper stewardship and loving care for all, including the earth, as much as we can.

I could write pages about specific ways to reduce, reuse, and recycle. Caring for the earth is definitely one of my passions. Suffice it to say that little things can make a difference and that our actions often do speak louder than words. Consider some of your daily routines and habits and think about ways you could change them to lessen the use of some of our precious resources or be kinder to the earth. New habits and routines are always difficult, but keep in mind that we teach by doing and that we can have a profound impact on how children and those around us learn stewardship.



Our congregation provides ways to reduce, reuse, and recycle items. The city of Omaha and the metro area offer various ways and means of recycling all kinds of things. I'd be happy to visit with anyone who has questions or needs suggestions.

# The 2011 Summer Bible Study

The *Lutheran Woman Today* (LWT) Summer Bible study is the same one that will be used at Triennial in July. Participants will have the opportunity to meet the authors, the Rev. Catherine Malotky and the Rev. David Engelstad. They have spent two and a half decades as ELCA pastors, serving congregations together in the early years and then following separate ministerial paths into communications and chaplaincy. Their interests in spiritual direction, coaching, and faith formation inspired this Bible study.

Deb Lund will once again host a day retreat in August (date TBA) at her home, where we will cover all three sessions. All women are invited to participate, and you will not need the *Lutheran Woman Today* magazine. The individual lessons will be available online in May.

The comments below are taken from the LWT website:

The cloud of witnesses surrounding us can teach us much about what it means to bring your best self to the life you've been given. This summer's Bible study in *Lutheran Woman Today* will invite readers into the dynamic web of life anchored by "renew, respond, and rejoice." This is vocation in the richest sense of that term: Who are you and how are you called to service in a world full of surprises? There is so much to do. How do we stay spiritually healthy in the face of overwhelming need?

#### Session 1: Renew

The first session challenges us to "get unstuck." The writers explore the issue of hardness of heart. The key verse is Psalm 51:10-12, which begins "Create in me a clean heart, O God." The session looks at two important stories in the Hebrew Bible, one centered on King David and the other on Hagar. Readers will consider questions such as: How do I know when and what kind of renewal I need? How can I renew myself when so many others depend on me? Who benefits from my renewal?

#### Session 2: Respond

This session reminds us that we are gifted to serve. The key verses are Luke 1:46-48, which we know so well: "My soul magnifies the Lord...." In this session, readers will explore the way response flows from renewal. We'll consider the stories of two women: Mary the mother of Jesus, and the widow at Zarephath. Critical questions for this session are: How do I discern which of my gifts God wishes me to offer to others at this time? What do I do if God seems to be asking me for more than or less than I think I have to offer? Who do I serve? Where will/can I offer my gifts? How do I serve from a sense of fullness?

#### Session 3: Rejoice

This session exhorts us to "Rejoice in the Lord." The key Scripture is Philippians 4:4. Readers will explore the cycle of faith between renew, respond, and rejoice. We'll study the stories of Miriam and the witness of the paralyzed man's friends (Mark 2:1-12). We'll reflect on: How do I rejoice when things are complicated or unresolved? What feelings inspire rejoicing? Might there be some additional feelings to associate with rejoicing? How does rejoicing spring out of responding and lead again to renewal?



# JUST FOR KIDS



HOT CROSS BUNS

Make this traditional Easter recipe to remember how Christ gave his life for you.

#### What you need:

- 1 can (12 oz.) evaporated milk
- 1 stick (½ cup) butter, melted
- ½ cup sugar
- Pinch of salt
- 1½ Tablespoons yeast
- 1 egg, beaten
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 5 cups flour
- Icing
- An adult to help

#### What you do:

- 1. In large bowl, combine the first eight ingredients.
- 2. Stir in flour, one cup at a time, to form soft dough. Knead on a floured surface until smooth and elastic (about five minutes).
- 3. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise until doubled (about one hour).
- 4. Knead out air bubbles. Form six two-inch balls.
- 5. Place two inches apart on a greased cookie sheet. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 30 minutes).
- 6. Bake at 375 degrees until golden (13 to 15 minutes). Cool on wire racks.
- 7. Add icing in a cross shape. Enjoy!




