ELCA National Youth Gathering Recap, by Heather Christensen



How do you describe our experiences on a week-long journey to the National Youth Gathering in Detroit in only a few short paragraphs?

This trip was a time to grow in faith and to grow as a person. It was full of new experiences, providing service to others, meeting people from across the country, hearing about struggles and overcoming obstacles and considering how those stories relate to our life and proclaiming that Jesus is Good News! We sang, we danced, we laughed, we hugged, and, yes, we proclaimed that Jesus is Good News!

We traveled to Waterville, OH, on the first night and stayed at Zion Lutheran Church.

We spent the next morning cleaning 3 parks of garbage and fallen tree limbs (see photo above). The parks and recreation team were most grateful for our help.

After lunch, we loaded our bus and went the final miles into Detroit. Wednesday we had the opportunity to play at the "fancy pool" and did some swimming and enjoyed waterslides, lazy river and a wave pool.

Afterwards, we headed into downtown Detroit for our first night of congregating at Ford Field with 30,000 other Lutheran youth and their sponsors. Night after night we heard amazing music and messages from speakers whose stories shared (continued on next page)

how they fought to *break chains, build bridges, bear burdens, and bring hope.*These were the daily themes of the Gathering.

We were encouraged to consider Detroit as an example, our hometown, or our life as an example of how we could find our way through oppression to hope through God.

Knowing that I am a Child of God and dearly, unconditionally loved, what can I do to make a difference? It was, at times, powerful and moving. What an impact that 30,000 rising up in praise can make!

Friday we spent the day with the Nebraska Synod and Bishop Brian Maas. We made new friends from across the state and found old friends from other events, or previous schools.

Our Proclaim Justice Day (community service day in Detroit) didn't turn out as planned due to an unfortunate car accident on the interstate. Our youth had great attitudes, continued to meet new people, and had their hearts in the right place.

So we improvised and cleaned up trash in Heart Plaza for our service so that it was clean for the next day's visitors. We celebrated and enjoyed hearing what others then were able to do in the Detroit community the remainder of the week.



We found that we have a "super cool" bishop who is engaging and inspiring. Bishop Eaton shared her laughter, her faith struggles, her inspiration, her zip line, her community service and her experiences in Detroit with us. It was good for the youth to see that in a faith leader.

And so it was a wonderful week. Full of faith, fun, and hope. Now we take that faith, put it into action, and go give others Hope. **Jesus is...Good News!**

They call it a "Skittle Explosion" - all the bright colored shirts at Ford Field

During the Youth Gathering "Proclaim Justice Days":

- 1 million diapers collected
- 1,425 backpacks distributed
- 3,200 vacant lots cleared of debris
- 319 vacant homes boarded
- 1,847 mural boards painted
- 36 urban gardens installed
- 99 picnic tables built
- 26 dumpsters filled
- 600 neighborhoods affected
- 78.8 gallons of blood (607 pints) donated

In addition to the need of Detroit residents, the youth and adults at the Gathering also learned about global needs, such as clean water. In response, the ELCA World Hunger's Walk for Water exhibit raised more than \$402,000 during the event. Lord of Love contributed \$2,055 to the Walk for Water.

Giving Status

General Fund financial information for June 2015:

Giving for 2015 is down over \$8,500 compared to this time last year. The weekly giving average for 2015 is \$5,487 compared to \$5,816 last year. Weekly expenses average \$6,025 for 2015. The weekly budgeted expense for 2015 is \$6,799. You can see that the council is being very careful with spending this year, down almost \$800 per week when actual spending is compared to the approved budget.

Stewarship: "Unglamorous yet vital"

Our relationship with money is a profoundly spiritual issue

A church in the Northeastern Ohio Synod describes itself as a "50/50" congregation. It gives away half of offerings received. A significant portion goes to mission support, but the congregation also supports local projects and ministries. I visited this congregation on the day it was bringing in offerings for a special appeal. Somber parishioners came forward and placed their offerings in a basket before the altar *(continued on next page)*.

Farther back in the congregation I noticed a girl, maybe five years old, sitting on her father's lap. She squirmed and wriggled until he gave her his

offering and set her loose. She came tearing down the aisle, check held high, looking for all the world as if she had won the lottery.

As she returned to her seat, I pointed out the joy of giving this little girl embodied. Someone from the congregation quipped, "It's not her money." I waited for a minute and then said, "No, it's her Father's money."

We have a conflicted relationship with money. We claim that it can't buy us love or happiness on the one hand but measure our worth and security by it on the other. We don't like to talk about money in church. We've talked about human sexuality in this church for years, but we don't talk about money. It's just beyond the pale.

I remember an interview with a call committee where I asked to see the treasurer's reports. I was told: "Oh no, pastor, you worry about spiritual matters and we'll worry about the finances." But our relationship with money is a profoundly spiritual issue. Our peculiar relationship with money can hold us in a kind of bondage.

Jesus knew this when he encountered a rich man who claimed to have kept the commandments from his youth but still felt something was missing. When Jesus told him to sell everything he had, give it to the poor and follow him, he "was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions" (Mark 10:17-22). He was possessed.

Giving is a spiritual discipline. It's a way for us to learn to live by faith. It's a way to participate in God's generosity and abundance. It's a way to move beyond ourselves. It's also a way for us to be connected one to another. Responding to the grace and prodigal love of God expressed in the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus, our giving is a communal act. Giving isn't a private thing any more than worship is. It's part of our life together.

Giving is a spiritual discipline.

I'm not talking about the ostentatious and self-serving giving that Jesus warns against in Matthew 6:2-4, but the intentional and, in her case, extravagant offering of the widow at the temple (Mark 12:41-44). Hers was a public act of faith and participation in the corporate life of the community.

One of our responsibilities as children of God is to care for our earth. There were some great articles in the April Lutheran that are now available online. Here is a list from one of those articles:

Things individuals and families can do to help save the planet:

- Get outdoors. Turning off electronics and being out in creation — wherever you live — is the first (literal) step toward presence to the world.
- Walk and bike on errands. While human-powered transportation takes longer, it's fun and life-giving.
- Eat less meat, switch to locally produced meat and/or join a CSA (community supported agriculture) program to support local agriculture.
- Pray outdoors in all weather.



- Get a home energy audit and implement as many of its findings as you can.
- Compost your food waste, a big step toward reducing landfill volume, and use the results in a garden to grow your own food.
- Get to know the neighbors: migratory songbirds, native flowers, invasive species, honeybees and other insects. Avoid use of pesticides.


