FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR

New Year's Greetings,

As I write this I am still in the process of "getting my bearings" -- sleeping and eating at times to which I have been accustomed most of my life.

Returning from Thailand in the midst of the holidays prolongs this process as I cook breakfast for the grandkids at nine or later. Then we eat a big meal mid-afternoon and "graze" the rest of the day. I nap in the afternoon, go to bed later than usual, and sleep in as late as the grandkids will let me.

Now as our daughters and their families head home to eastern lowa and I prepare for two funerals, it is important that my life return to the routine of the clock. In Thailand it was amazing how little of our time was measured by the clock. The only occasions where we would pay any attention to the clock was when we had a flight to catch. Otherwise, we ate when we were hungry, slept when we were tired, and arrived when we got there.

In Greek (the language of the New Testament), there are two words for time. *Chronos* is the word used for measured time -- "clock time" or "calendar" time.

The other Greek word for time is *kairos*, which refers to the timeliness of someone's actions or presence. In the Bible, *kairos* is often used to denote the timeliness of the Spirit's action in the lives of God's people.

Living in a culture so focused on "measured" time, it is difficult to open ourselves to the *kairos* of the Spirit's activity in our lives. Yet, in the midst of the process of calling a new pastor, that is what we are called to do -- to trust that Spirit will act in a timely manner to call the pastor who God intends to lead Lord of Love in the mission and ministry of God's people in this time and place.




The Meaning of Epiphany (from newsletternewsletter.com)

Epiphany, which comes from the Greek word *epiphaneia*, means "an appearance" or "a revealing." Centuries ago, the church set aside January 6, the 12th day after Christmas, to mark the revealing of Jesus as Christ to the wise men, who were Gentiles. Jesus' first followers were Jewish, so the revelation of the divine Christ to the non-Jewish magi reminds us that Jesus came to earth to save the whole world.

Symbols of Epiphany include light, a star, a crown (or three crowns) and a globe or stylized portrayal of the world. The color of Epiphany is green to symbolize life, growth, hope and eternity.

On the church calendar, the Epiphany season lasts until Ash Wednesday [Feb. 10 in 2016], which is determined by the date of Easter.

ELCA Presiding Bishop Issues Letter to Muslim American Community

CHICAGO (ELCA) – In a Dec. 11 letter to the Muslim-American community, the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), said, "I am writing on behalf of many Christians in this country who wish to share a word of solidarity, love and hope with you in these difficult days."

"In our love for you, our Muslim neighbors, we are distressed by the ways in which you are being forced to bear the fears held by many in our nation," Eaton wrote. "Therefore, we renew our commitment to find even more effective ways to protect and defend you from words and actions that assault your safety and well-being. We believe God calls us to resist what is divisive, discriminatory, xenophobic, racist or violent, and we want you to look to us as allies and friends."



The full text of the letter follows:

"Grace and peace to you. I am writing on behalf of many Christians in this country who wish to share a word of solidarity, love and hope with you in these difficult days.

"In this season of Advent, we, your Christian neighbors, are preparing to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, who commanded that "you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart ... [and] you shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:30-31, NRSV).

"In our love for you, our Muslim neighbors, we are distressed by the ways in which you are being forced to bear the fears held by many in our nation. Therefore, we renew our commitment to find even more effective ways to protect and defend you from words and actions that assault your safety and well-being. We believe God calls us to resist what is divisive, discriminatory, xenophobic, racist or violent, and we want you to look to us as allies and friends.

"The global refugee and migrant crisis and the acts of terror committed in this country and around the world are challenges that demand our collective efforts and our common prayers. (cont., next page)

Therefore, we will seek to stand shoulder to shoulder with you as agents of peace, justice, understanding, welcome and reconciliation for the sake of the world that God so loves.

"In this holy season, when we anticipate the light that the darkness cannot overcome (John 1:5, NRSV), we are reminded of God's gift of life abundant for all. Together with you, we are committed to building a stronger society based on the dignity of each human being, the value of diversity, the holiness of creation and the common good. We pledge our partnership and invite our local communities into continued dialogue and engagement to this end."





Stewardship, continued

New Year's resolutions are often focused on personal health – losing weight, relaxing more, or getting rid of bad habits. It is certainly important to take good care of our bodies. But Christianity offers us a fuller concept of self-improvement. In fact, every aspect of ourselves – physical, mental, spiritual, emotional - can benefit from an annual self-audit. Some people have taken to heart this multi-faceted concept and each year make one resolution for each area. For instance, one could resolve to join a prayer group to work on spirituality, or take a continuing education course to build mental skills. Still others use the virtues of faith, hope and love to guide their resolution-making process.

By now, you may have discerned a similarity between New Year's resolutions and stewardship commitments. First, we use a similar method to think about stewardship, by breaking it down into more specific concepts of time, talent and treasure. Second, to become better stewards, we write down our commitments. We record our good intentions to clarify exactly what they are and to remind us of our commitment.


