5th Wednesday in Lent March 24, 2021

Each week, we will explore one of the gifts of discipleship. In the Affirmation of Baptism service (a.k.a. Confirmation), we speak publicly before God saying that we intend to continue to live out our baptismal callings claiming the faith as our own. The question that we respond to asks us to affirm these five gifts of discipleship as our intent of living out our faith.

QUESTION: Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

- To live among God's faithful people. (Week 1)
- To hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, (Week 2)
- To proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, (Week 3)
- To serve all people, following the example of Jesus, (Week 4)
- And strive for justice and peace in all the earth? (Week 5)

RESPONSE: I do, and I ask God to help and guide me. (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 236)





WEEK 4 READINGS

Micah 6:6-8

"With what shall I come before the LORD, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? Will the LORD be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

Luke 24:36-49

While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate

in their presence.

Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you — that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."



*LORD'S PRAYER


Lord remember us in your kingdom and teach us to pray:
